Preface

Qatar University Fact Book is an annual publication that provides the university community and beyond with a comprehensive summary of institutional information about the colleges, centers, and departments. Its primary purpose is to guide and promote QU's development

and progress. A large part of the information presented in this edition is supported by a range of tables and graphs.

In keeping with the practice of highlighting a theme of significance to Qatar University, it was decided, for this year's edition, to shine a light on Ranking which has been the subject of targeted institutional efforts over the last few years. QU has enjoyed a number of successes, the most recent of which was No 1. in the Round University Rankings 2016 in the Arab Region, No 1 in international outlook in THE World University Rankings 2015-2016, and No 9 in QS Arab Region University Rankings 2016.

This shows marked improvement from previous years and serves to advance the organization's commitment and dedication to quality education and to its advancement in the direction of world-class standard in teaching, research, international outlook, and industry engagement. While QU is improving in almost all the rankings indicators, notably its organized data reporting and understanding of the various rankings and criteria have served to add to the improvement.

QU has also emerged as a key participant in the dialogue on university rankings, hosting two major international rankings conferences, gaining membership in IREG Observatory on Academic Ranking and Excellence, and presenting at rankings forums around the world.

In February 2015, the organization, in partnership with Times Higher Education (THE), hosted the first edition of Times Higher Education MENA Universities Summit. The event. which was organized for the first time in the region, was dedicated to the development of world-class education and research in the region. Later that year, QU hosted the fifth QS MAPLE Conference and Exhibition on May 5-7. Themed "International Innovation and Co-operation in Higher Education", the event aimed to help build world-class universities for Middle Fastern and North African communities through global partnerships and collaborations, and to support the processes of institutional evaluation and upgrading that will lead to greater worldwide recognition of universities in these regions. QU members also participated in the Rankings Session, which discussed the world rankings and rating systems, and the various criteria by which universities are ranked at the international and regional level.

One of the highlights of QU's growing international visibility in the dialogue on rankings was the award of full membership in the IREG Observatory on Academic Ranking and Excellence, an international institutional non-profit association of ranking organizations, universities and other bodies interested in university rankings and academic excellence. The organization joins a list of 40 members comprising universities, higher education institutes and quality

assurance and rankings organizations from around the world.

QU also had a presence via presentations and information booths at IREG in Denmark (June 2015) and Portugal (May 2016), 2nd Times Higher Education (THE) MENA Universities Summit (Al Ain, February 2016), and 6th QS MAPLE Conference and Exhibition (Al Ain, May 2016).

The organization will host the next IREG conference themed "Excellence as University Driving Force" in March 12-14 next year, making Qatar the first in the region to host the forum. This will highlight QU's growing reputation as an institution of academic and research excellence, as well as Qatar's pioneering role in hosting such international events.

The organization continues its focus and commitment to pursuing academic and research quality and excellence, always cognizant of its responsibility to answer local needs and expectations while striving towards international standards of success

We trust that you will find the information in the ensuing pages of QU Fact Book valuable to your respective interests and appreciate any feedback that will help us improve and refine its content and delivery.

QU is supported by a visionary and talented Board of Regents and an institutional leadership comprising 6 Vice Presidents and one Associate Vice President. The organization appointed its 6th President in June 2015.

The organization is committed to providing high-quality education in areas of national priority. Underpinning this commitment is the goal to align its colleges, programs and courses with established international standards and best practices. As a result, QU has been successful in its accreditation initiatives, earning the endorsement of numerous leading international accrediting bodies.

QU has achieved a number of rankings successes, the most recent of which was No 1 in the Round University Rankings 2016 in the Arab Region, No 1 in international outlook in THE World University Rankings 2015-2016, and No 9 in QS Arab Region University Rankings 2016.

QU now hosts 9 colleges - Arts and Sciences (CAS); Business and Economics (CBE); Education (CED); Engineering (CENG); Health Sciences (CHS), Law (LAWC); Medicine (CMED); Pharmacy (CPH); and Sharia and Islamic Studies (CSIS) offer the widest range of academic programs with 39 Bachelors, 25 Masters, 4 Diplomas, Doctor of Medicine, Doctor of Pharmacy (Pharm.D.), and 4 Doctoral programs in Qatar tailoring them to meet the needs of Qatari society.

The College of Health Sciences was a new addition in January 2016, emerging from the Department of Health Sciences formerly housed in the College of Arts & Sciences. Following this, a Health Education Cluster was established to promote interdisciplinary and interprofessional collaboration among the colleges of health sciences, medicine and pharmacy, and enhance the quality of health education and research as well as institutional effectiveness at the university. QU has continued to develop a vibrant research culture that is reflected in its ambitious research 5-year roadmap entitled "Advancing Research for Qatar's Future", listing four priority research areas - Energy, Environment & Resource Sustainability; Social Change & Identity; Population, Health & Wellness; and Information, Communication Technologies. Its graduate programs, 14 research centers of excellence, accredited laboratory facilities, and a teaching and learning environment that places research and international collaboration at the core. Additionally, the organization's commitment to research excellence is reflected in the success it continues to

enjoy in the National Priorities Research Program (NPRP) and Undergraduate Research Experience Program (UREP) cycles of Qatar National Research Fund (QNRF).

Community engagement is an area, which is at the heart of QU's mission and vision. The organization continues to align its programs and research activities with the needs of the labor market. It also reinforces its position as a driver of social development through the services it offers to the community such as education and training in various disciplines through professional development programs at its Continuing Education Office, College of Pharmacy, and College of Law.

QU is advancing its goal to become a leader of economic and social development in Qatar through MOUs signed agreements, and academic partnerships with industry, government, academia, business and civil society in Qatar and beyond.

A Glance At History

In 1973, acknowledging education as a key contribution to Qatar's growth and development, the Emir of Qatar issued a decree proclaiming the establishment of Qatar's first national College of Education. In its first year, 57 male and 93 female students were admitted to the College.

Rapid development of the country prompted the expansion of the College to accommodate new areas of specialization. In 1977, Qatar University was founded with four colleges: Education; Humanities & Social Sciences; Sharia, Law & Islamic Studies; and Science. In 1980, the College of Engineering was established, followed by the College of Business & Economics in 1985. The College of Pharmacy was launched in 2008, having been reformed from the Pharmacy Program. In 2014, Qatar's first national College of Medicine was launched at QU – this was followed by the establishment of the College of Health Sciences in 2016.

Our Campus


Qatar University campus is situated on the northern edge of Doha, approximately 16 kilometers from the city center. It overlooks the coast, Doha Golf Course, West Bay Lagoon housing complex, and is in relatively close distance to the Pearl and Al-Wusail commercial and residential development projects on the eastern side. QU also has an experimental farm located 65 km north of Doha.

The main campus is built on a total area of about 8 square kilometers, of distinguished and modern architecture that also reflects the ideals of traditional Islamic design and the university's position as a leading proponent of Islamic, Arabic, and Qatari values.

The campus is divided into two sections - male and female, each with its own lecture halls, laboratories, learning-support units, and sports and cafeteria

facilities. Continuing developments to the campus infrastructure include new buildings for Pharmacy and Medicine, student halls, and a dedicated Student Center.

QU is also the site for one of the rail stations being constructed in Qatar in preparation for FIFA World Cup 2022.




HONORS PROGRAM



Educational Support Services

Office of Faculty and Instructional Development (OFID)

OFID supports QU academic staff with ongoing professional development programs and resources. The Office facilitates and supports faculty research endeavors and the implementation of best teaching practices in a collaborative working environment through workshops and seminars on curriculum enhancement and innovations.

With the aim to continuously improve the teaching and learning process and respond to the needs of faculty members, OFID offers numerous workshops / seminars and training programs in four areas: active learning; assessment at the course and program levels;, technology; and research. It further expanded its services as follows to enhance faculty professional development:

- Integrated technology such as BB9.1, Socrative clickers, Blackboard Collaborate, QR Readers, etc.
- One-on-one orientation of faculty members to Blackboard features
- Lecture-captured workshop sessions via Echo 360
- Online professional development training programs
- Annual events such as Academic Orientation Day (YAHALA), OFID Day, June PD activities, and First-Year Focus Faculty Professional Development Day
- Updated list of online resources including Magna Online seminars, inhouse-produced tutorials, Blackboard resources, and OFID Workshop materials.

Student Counseling Center (SCC)

The SCC provides students with guidance, support and opportunities to enrich their development and well-being towards improved academic performance, retention, and success. It also provides consultation initiatives to faculty and staff on student-related issues to advance a healthy and supportive campus environment.

Quick Facts:

- 1. 2,677 students benefited from SCC services during the academic year 2015-2016.
- 2. 95% of students sought help with personal difficulties, communication skills, psychological issues, and academic issues.
- 3. 16 workshops were conducted during the year 2015-2016.
- 4. Approximately 90% of the 669 students who attended SCC workshops expressed a high level of satisfaction.
- 5. Approximately 1,577 individual counseling sessions were conducted during the academic year 2015-2016.

The Center holds annual events and provides programs to QU students to foster their levels of self-development and academic performance. During the academic year 2015-16, the center provided activities on several themes and issues:

- **1. Self-Development:** To help students attain clear vision about their future, maximize their potential, and enrich their well-being.
- 2. First Year Success: To support first-year students through the transition from high school to university.
- **3. Married students' sessions:** To help married students balance personal / martial and academic responsibilities.
- 4. Communication Skills: To support students with effective interaction skills.
- **5. "Medical Students' Perception and Reality" workshop:** To engage prospective medical students on perceptions of the profession, expectations, opportunities and challenges.
- **6. Community Art:** To bring people together and encourage better interpersonal relations through artistic activities.
- **7. Your well-being in Action:** To promote students' well-being through different activities.
- **8. Peer Helpers Training Program:** To engage prospective peer helpers on comprehensive knowledge and practical skills to enable them to address stress and wellbeing with the aim to provide nonprofessional psychosocial assistance to their fellow students.

The SCC also fostered collaboration with professionals inside and outside QU to facilitate the following workshops:

9. Art Therapy: To provide a unique approach for helping students improve psychological health by understanding human development, psychological theories and techniques with visual arts.

- **10. Color your life:** Students explored how the strength of color can change life for the better, and learned basic techniques of painting.
- 11. Nothing is Impossible under the Sun: To empower students to achieve their goals.
- **12. Just a little push! :** To support students in weight loss in association with Female Sports Hall.
- **13. Stress management:** In association with College of Education, to provide students with techniques to manage stress.
- **14. Positive Thinking:** In association with College of Education, to provide methods, models and techniques to alter negative thoughts to positive.
- **15. "Be good feel good"** (2 workshops).
- **16. Improve the quality of life:** To engage students on improving life skills.

Career Services Center (CSC)

The CSC assists students and alumni in achieving a clear vision of life-long career planning and development. The center offers a Student Employment Program, career counselling, and organizes Job fairs to bring students, alumni and employers together.









STUDENT ACTIVITIES AND ENGAGEMENT

During AY 2015-2016, the Student Activities Department provided a wide range of programs, activities, events and co-curricular opportunities that helped to expand students' learning experiences beyond the classroom to the broader university community and the wider Qatar society.

During the academic year, the Department hosted nine campuswide events designed to celebrate the traditions, culture and community of QU and Qatar, and sponsored five notable speakers and other co-curricular events. The Student Clubs and Organizations Section enjoyed a 2nd consecutive record-breaking year with:

- 74 active student clubs.
- Total membership of approximately 4,000 students.



- Organization of over 220 events by various student clubs and organizations.
- Attendance of over 5,000 visitors at the largest student-organized media event "Media exhibition إعلامي غير شكل " in Doha hosted in May.
- 1st and 3rd-place wins by the Debate Club in the International Universities Arabic Debating Championship.
- Visit by President of Turkey as an initiative of Anatolian Club.

Center for Volunteerism and Civic Responsibility exceeded expectations in several areas:

- Connected over 3000 volunteers with more than 60 campus and community groups throughout the academic year.
- Planned, organized and hosted two signature annual events--International Volunteer Day and Youth Volunteer Forum.
- Planned, organized and implemented two new student-led community engagement projects—-- iCharity and "Lag2 wa Lakan" for Syria.
- Organized an international servicelearning trip to Indonesia.
- Supported 5 senior co-curricular projects related to community engagement and corporate social responsibility (CSR).

Student Exchange Program:

• Facilitated international learning experiences for 250 students to 19 countries, providing off-campus opportunities such as participation in academic conferences, regional and international competitions, cultural and educational fieldtrips, research and internships.

• Hosted a delegation from China, in cooperation with the Embassy of China, for the Qatar-China cultural exchange program in February 2016.

QU LEADS (Leadership, Education and Development for Students) is a certificate program offered by Student Activities Department in collaboration with academic departments, other universities, governmental organizations and entities. The program is designed to meld together traditional concepts of student leadership development, learning and student life to create an experience that prepares students to engage actively in a world that is dynamic and full of challenge.

The QU LEADS program successfully piloted Level 1 of a four-level leadership certificate course during the 2015-16 academic year with approximately 30 student-leader participants. The first annual Taqadam - Student Leadership Development Conference was held in March with about 300 student participants from Qatar University, HBKU-- Education City Branch Campuses, CCQ, CNAQ, University of Calgary in Qatar, and Stenden University-Qatar, to facilitate the dissemination of the basic tenets of the Program.

In 2015/2016, the Sports and Recreation Section provided a wide range of programs on health and well-being, and several competitive team sports engaging the entire QU as well as other Qatar-based universities and organizations:

· Health and Wellness Programs

- Programs that included fitness sessions and bodybuilding courses for male students, and aerobic sessions for female students.
- Regular beginner-level swimming courses at the Aquatic Center organized by a student committee.
- First-aid workshop and sports injuries seminar held in collaboration with HMC.
- Anti-Doping workshop organized in collaboration with Qatar National Anti-Doping Committee.
- Courses in volleyball, field hockey and tennis for QU staff and their families.
- Several sport events with various colleges and departments such as the International Anti-Obesity Day in coordination with College of Medicine, Engineering College Football League, and College of Business and Economics Football League.




QU has had considerable success in the National Priorities Research Program (NPRP) under Qatar National Research Fund (QNRF).

Number of Submitted Proposals per Cycle





RESEARCH CENTERS

As a premier national institution, QU continues to invest in and participate in research studies and projects that benefit society. As both a leader in emerging technologies and an environmentally-conscious institution, QU's autonomous research units strive to make an impact on a global scale.

Biomedical Research Center (BRC)

BRC is committed to improving health in Qatar by focusing on research, training, and service in applied and basic biomedical research within two major areas: metabolic disease; and communicable disease.

BRC implemented its strategy by working internally with colleges such as Health Sciences, Arts & Sciences, and Medicine as well as the Environmental Science Center, and externally with HMC, SIDRA, HBKU, and Ministry of Public Health (MoPH).

BRC reached out to the industrial sector in Qatar by starting a collaborative project with ExxonMobil for the project of "Dugong DNA Sequencing" and other industrial partners such as RasGas and Shell.

Center for Advanced Materials (CAM)

CAM conducts novel research in the field of innovative materials to support technology in various fields such as energy and environment. It provides universal knowledge on the four essential elements of materials science and engineering: processing/synthesis, structure, properties and applications and conducts research in the following categories: Nanotechnology, Polymer Composites and Nano Composites, Corrosion Protection, Metallurgy, Biomedical Applications and Construction, Environmental, Energy and Sustainable Materials.

The Center attracts leading international scholars and offers high-level expertise to local industries particularly oil and gas as well as the tertiary technical education sector in Qatar. It provides opportunities to faculty and students to interact with the industry, and actively participate in a range of projects. Its main partners are QP, QATALUM, QAPCO, QAFAC, QVC, Qatar Steel, Maersk Oil-Qatar, Qatar Shell, Oryx GTL Hydro and international universities and research institutes around the world, as well as QU colleges such as Arts and Sciences, Engineering, and Pharmacy as well as the Environmental Science Center and Gas Processing Center.

It has strong links with various public agencies and the private sector to carry out studies that address the challenges of environmental sustainability. ESC also has a number of regional and international research collaborations in the environmental sciences with prestigious overseas universities and government institutions.

Gas Processing Center (GPC)

The Gas Processing Center (GPC) is a research center launched in 2007 by the College of Engineering at Qatar University to take part in solving technical challenges that face the gas industry by relating advances in applied and basic science research to opportunities in the gas industry. The GPC works with major companies involved in Oil & Gas industries. In that regard, GPC works with the aim to develop solutions for technical problems that face the gas industry in Qatar. The Center has four main themes of research: Produced and Processed Water Treatment; Catalysis and Catalytic Processes; CO2 Capture; and Upstream Gas Processing. In addition, the GPC hosts three major pilot plants: CO2 capture pilot plant (funded by the VPR), Produced water pilot plant (funded by MAERSK), and Heat Exchanger Pilot Plant (funded by QAFCO). The Center work force is composed of seven full time research faculty; one research assistant and two technicians in addition to part-time post-doctoral fellow, research assistants and students hired against the different projects.

The Center offers the following services:

- o Offers consultancy on Gas Processing issues to the consortium members.
- o Conducts generic research agreed with the consortium members and other partners including QU academics and centers.
- o Offers a testing service to the consortium and to the wider community
- o Organizes scientific events such as technical workshops and colloquia
- o Organizes the International Gas Processing Symposium every 2 years
- o Conducts regular training courses by world leading experts in areas of importance to the consortium members
- o Runs an outreach program fronted by the GASNA competition. This is a K-12 schools competition designed to raise awareness about the importance of gas to our youngsters and to emphasize the importance of science as well as increase the intake into engineering programs at QU.
- o Provides internal services to other QU department in the form of chemical and physical characterization of research materials.

The Center supports Qatar University's leading role in education and research in areas of biological and biomedical sciences with focus on research areas of priority at the university and national levels such as obesity, cardiovascular diseases and cancer. All animals in the facility are housed in individually-ventilated cages (IVC) in a strictly SPF and microcontrolled environment.

Social and Economic Survey Research Institute (SESRI)

In 2015/2016, SESRI conducted a range of national and regional-level surveys in collaboration with international and national research partners, including University of Michigan, World Values Survey Association (WVSA), Northwestern University in Qatar, Emory University, and University of Toronto. SESRI also collaborated with a range of national stakeholders (governmental and semi-governmental), including Qatar Foundation, Qatar Businessmen Association, Ministry of Transport and Communications, Ministry of Culture and Sports and Qatar Tourism Authority.

In AY 2015-2016, SESRI signed a number of service collaborative research agreements and MOUs with:

- **1. Qatar Foundation** -- Qatar Genome Project to conduct a study on exploring knowledge and attitudes towards genetic research.
- **2. Ministry of Culture and Sports** to conduct surveys that will explore Trends in Participation in Sport and Physical Activities among Qatari Citizens (Adults and Students).
- **3. Qatar Foundation** -- research and development (Qatar Foundation) in the implementation of surveys in Qatar to understand perceptions of the general public about research and avenues for increasing awareness and to understand also the perceptions of academics, grant applicants, media and other influencers/stakeholders about research, science and technology.
- **4. Ministry of Transport and Communications (MOTC)** to participate in the Better Connections Program that aims to raise ICT awareness among migrant labors in Qatar. SESRI will research the impact of the Program on the beneficiaries and relevant stakeholders and manage all efforts needed for study implementation on the ground including developing research methodology and instruments, conducting fieldwork, data analysis and reporting.

College Research Centers

Center for Energy and Sustainability Law (CESL)

Housed at the College of Law, the Center's goal is to act as the Middle East's first permanent 'think tank' dedicated to energy and environmental law, offering a platform of interaction between industry, academia and government agencies. Its mission is to find solutions to the challenges of increasing energy demand, associated environmental degradation and calls for sustainability in the regional and global context. As a public-private initiative, the Center promotes legislative and policy development in conjunction with national and regional Ministries, international organizations and research communities.

The Center is in the process of finalizing an institutional collaboration with the Center for Global Energy, International Arbitration and Environmental Law at the University of Texas at Austin. In addition, it is developing collaborations with the Maguire Energy Institute at the Cox Business School at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Texas, the McCombs School of Business at the University of Texas at Austin and the Price Business School at the University of Oklahoma, Oklahoma.

Center for Entrepreneurship (CE)

The Center in the College of Business and Economics was launched in September 2013 with the mandate to:

- Create awareness of entrepreneurial activities by running workshops, networks and seminars at various QU colleges, and launching competitive events such as the Entrepreneurship and Innovation Contest to encourage students towards creative and innovative business ideas.
- Provide educational and training programs for potential entrepreneurs (students, faculty and staff), startups and scale-up projects, such as the ERADA training program and other professional training programs in marketing, finance, and accounting.
- Conduct scientific research in various disciplines of entrepreneurship and run entrepreneurship research competitions.
- Provide business incubation services that include incubating promising business ideas and availing resources and services to incubates such as physical space, one-on-one coaching, assistance in preparing business plans, support in accessing funding and building a network of fellow entrepreneurs.

The Center was awarded a research grant from the Ministry of Economy and Commerce to conduct a research project on financing opportunities for SMEs and Entrepreneurs (April -December 2015). It also achieved an NPRP award for a project on "Stimulating SME exports".

Center for Humanities and Social Sciences (CHSS)

Another center at College of Arts and Sciences, CHSS aims to promote innovative and interdisciplinary research in humanities and social sciences, building human capacity by training a new generation of researchers and fostering joint research with leading international scholars to build an international network of researchers, focusing on mobilizing the knowledge of social sciences and humanities.

CHSS adopted two themes: Social and Behavioral Studies and Cultural Heritage and Humanities, each fielding 5 priority research topics:

Social and Behavioral Studies -- family studies; youth studies; social problems; civil society issues; and planning and socio-economic issues.

Cultural Heritage and Humanities -- archaeology; heritage; history of science in Islam; culture, identity, society; and contemporary cultural issues.

CHSS has built an interdisciplinary partnership to conduct joint research projects. It includes CAS departments of Humanities, Social Sciences, Arabic Language, English Language, and Biological and Environmental Sciences, and other colleges such as

Engineering and Pharmacy, as well as the Environmental Science Center, Sustainable Development Center, Gulf Studies Center and Social and Economic Survey Institute. CHSS created several partnerships with civil organizations, research institutions and created a research network with several Universities in the Gulf and international universities.

CHSS provides research services to local institutions, holds training workshops for CAS faculty, and attracts funds to support the students' research program.

Life is Engineering (LIEP)

This initiative at the College of Engineering engages Qatari students on scientific and engineering disciplines through hands-on interactive approaches to scientific theories and engineering applications.

High school students from independent schools are supervised on manufacturing race cars in a series of workshops by College of Engineering faculty and researchers. A final race is held at Lusail International Circuit where the teams compete and demonstrate the performance and speed of their cars. In AY 2015-2016, 12 teams participated in the project.

Center of Continuing Education

The Center of Continuing Education (CCE) connects QU and society by identifying and fulfilling the training needs of the public. It provides specialized training programs and preparedness programs for professional and international certification, enabling the wider community to benefit from the expertise, experience and resources available at the university.

National Center for Educational Development (NCED)

The Center, an initiative of College of Education, continued to expand professional development services provided to educators in Qatar during AY 2015-2016. In terms of professional development services, the Center engaged four areas of interest -- school based support program, school empowerment program, partnership program, and extending training program.

1. School-Based Support Program (SBSP)

The program was established to provide in-school professional support to selected independent schools. Its main purpose is to improve student learning and achievement through high quality school-based professional learning activities and research based best practices. It started with six independent schools and has since increased to eight independent schools. During the implementation of SBSP, 10 independent schools successfully completed the program's requirements, allowing 10 more schools to join the program.

2. School Empowerment Programs

This program is designed to provide selected schools high level of expertise, resources, support, and customized school-embedded professional learning activities for their new initiatives and innovative projects. Two major projects are currently ongoing under this

program:

Bridging the Gap: From High School to Higher Education:

This project focuses on identifying critical elements that students need for success at the university level and may not be receiving in their secondary education by monitoring a sample of students from identified schools, between the 10th grade to the first year of university study, to examine the development of an intervention program intended to bridge the gap between secondary education and university education.

Enhancing Student Motivation to Learn in Independent Schools:

The current project targets four independent schools in Qatar; two middle schools -- one for girls, the other for boys, and two secondary schools -- one for girls; the other for boys.

3. Partnership Programs

To date, there are four NCED partnership programs, as follows:

• Qatar University ExxonMobil Teachers Academy (QUEMTA): This is an initiative targeting independent school teacher's capabilities in math and science education based on STEM (Science Technology Engineering Mathematics) Education. In 2015, the Academy engaged 44 primary school teachers (4th-6th grade) from 26 independent schools. In addition, the Qatar University ExxonMobil Teachers Alumni Academy engaged 33 primary school teachers (4th -6th grade) from 31 independent schools.

- Future Scientists Academy (STEM) On January 17-21, 2016, 65 students (31 girls and 34 boys) from 11 schools participated in the 5-day learning and discovery experience under the instruction and supervision of NCED specialists.
- School-based Reform Project (TAMAM):

Under this collaborative research project, two schools joined the program four years ago, and participated in a collective conference Jordan this year. The schools were able to share their accomplishments, observe other school's performances, and reflect on their own developments.

• iEARN Project:

The ROTA partnership program with NCED engages students' learning through projects with peers from around the world. In the year 2015-2016, 327 students from 16 schools (Qatari Independent and International Schools) were supervised by 65 teachers to finally display 43 projects on the Open House Day (5-May -2016).

4. Extended Training Programs

This program is designed to provide schoolteachers and school leaders more in-depth conceptual understanding and a broader system of feedback and support through a series of workshops for topics of interest offered over several weeks end with a follow up session.

Early Childhood Center (ECC)

As part of its objective to train early childhood teachers and professionals to meet international standards, the ECC implemented the Creative Curriculum into the classrooms last year, and its teachers entered their second year of a 3-year training program intended to support them in learning and implementing the new curriculum. The Creative Curriculum aligns with the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) educational guidelines, to provide a program of the highest quality and implement a developmentally appropriate curriculum and activities. During the academic year, the Center provided 6 professional development training workshops.

In 2014, QU signed an MOU with LNG Corporation (LNG Japan) to establish the Training Center for Early Childhood Teachers (TCECT) to advance training for early childhood teachers. It will enhance the quality of academic programs offered by the college, develop related research,

and is set to become a regional model for early childhood training. When completed, the Center will also offer training courses and workshops as well as educational and psychological counseling to parents.

Educational Measurement and Evaluation Unit (EMEU)

Established in 2013 at the College of Education, the Unit provides its expertise in both education and psychology in developing educational and psychological tests for assessment purposes.



All Foundation Program faculty members volunteered in Qatar TESOL Conference 2016 organized by the Foundation Program that drew 500 attendees. 




Events are categorized as follows:





Houses offices, football stadium and encircling track. Accommodates 5,000.

A02 Main Court Pavilion

Houses offices and other facilities (handball and basketball).
Accommodates 900.

A03 Tennis Court Pavilion

Houses offices, tennis fields, and security rooms. Accommodates 900.

A04 Swimming Pool Pavilion

Houses offices, three swimming pools, gymnasium hall, and security rooms. Accommodates 1,500.

A05 Administrative Affairs Building

HR, Finance and Procurement Departments.

A06 Men's Foundation

Houses lecture rooms, labs, staff and faculty members' offices, meeting rooms and cafeteria.

B01 Administration Building

Houses the Office of the President and VPs, and Communications and Public Affairs Department, Conference Hall, Reception Hall, and meeting rooms.

B02 Men's Activity Center

Houses recreational facilities, Nurse Station, Post Office, special needs resource room, offices, and cafeteria.

B03 Information Technology Services

Houses IT support services, offices and meeting rooms.

B04 College of Education

Houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty members' offices, meeting rooms and cafeteria...

B05 Main Men's Building

Houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty members' offices, meeting rooms and cafeteria.

B06 Engineering Annex

Houses computer labs and offices.

B07 Engineering Workshop

Houses several offices.

B08 Green House

Houses indoor agricultural experiments under the College of Arts & Sciences.

B09 CENG Research Center

Houses academic offices and labs

C03 Faculty Office Building - 02

Blocks 1 to 4 -- College of Business and Economics; Blocks 7 to 8 -- Foundation Program.

B10 Qatar National Bank

Serves banking needs of QU community.

B11 Ibn Khaldoon Hall

Hosts events at QU.

B12 Mosque

Houses prayer hall and service rooms.

B13 Library Building

Accommodates reading lounges, study rooms, meeting rooms, auditoriums, display areas, stores, cafeterias and security rooms.

BCR Corridor A to J (Men's College of Arts and Sciences)

College of Arts & Sciences -- corridor A to E.

College of Engineering -- corridor F to J. Houses lecture rooms, labs, auditoriums, faculty members' offices and meeting rooms.

C09 Central Services Unit 1 (CSU-1)

Houses service machines such as chillers, main control room and food receiving area.

Women's campus

C01 Women's College of Arts & Sciences

Corridor A to F serves various departments under the college. It houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty members' offices, meeting rooms and cafeteria.

C02 Faculty Office Building - 01

Houses staff and administration offices

for the College of Education and Student Affairs.

C04 Main Women's Building

Houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty member offices, meeting rooms, cafeteria.

C05 Women's Activity Center

Houses offices, classrooms, entertainment facilities, Post Office, special needs resources.

C06 Medical Clinic

Houses doctors' rooms, testing rooms, and pharmacy.

C07 College of Engineering (Women)

Houses lecture rooms, labs, auditoriums, faculty members' offices, meeting rooms, and security rooms.

C08 Campus Facilities Department

Used as the main office for FMO, CPD, CBSO, Security Office, EHS, and College of Engineering labs.

C11 College of Sharia and Islamic Studies

Houses lecture rooms, labs, offices and food services.

C12 Admission and Registration Building

Houses administrative offices for course registration and student records.

D01 Al-Bidda Auditorium, Early Childhood Center, and Fine Arts

Houses offices, labs, and lecture rooms. Part of the building is used as a the College of Education's Early Childhood Center, a kindergarten for children and early childhood teacher training.

D02 Women's Car Park Arena

Houses offices and food services. It is considered a main point for female students to access various buildings on the women's campus.

D03 Women's Sports Facility

Houses main playing field, sports halls, sport facilities, lecture rooms and labs

D04 Women's Food Court

Houses Food Court, bookstore, a Masraf Al Rayan bank, internet café and administrative offices.

D05 Women's Foundation

Houses lecture rooms, labs, faculty members' offices, meeting rooms and cafeteria.

D06 Female's Classroom Building

Houses classrooms, computer labs and offices.

General campus area

E01 Main Gate No. 1

Houses porta cabins for security and access control system.

F01 Security Service Building

Houses security offices.

F02 Women's Gate No. 2

Houses porta cabins and offices for security.

H08 College Business & Economics

Combines the Colleges of Business & Economics and Law. Houses lecture halls, seminar rooms, computer labs, meeting rooms, faculty members' offices, stores and security rooms.

H09 New Central Service Unit 2

Located south-west of the Research Complex. It houses chillers, transformers, control service equipment, machines, and security rooms.

H10 New Research Complex Building

Used for learning, testing, and administrative functions, and has wing divisions for seven research units and a main administration unit. Houses lecture rooms, an auditorium, labs, meeting rooms, staff offices, storage rooms and security rooms.

H11 Gate No.5

Houses porta cabins and offices for security.

H12 College of Medicine

Houses lecture rooms, labs, student and faculty lounges, meeting rooms, and cafeteria.

101 General Services Section

Houses administrative offices.

102 Central and Maintenance Store

Houses offices, stores, workshops, etc.

103 Office Building

Houses administrative offices.

104 Gate No. 4

Houses security offices

105 Boatyard Building

Used as parking for boats.

Car Park Facilities

Campus Facilities Department (CFD)

successfully increased the number of car parking facilities at various locations within QU campus totaling 5,191 parking bays. The number of shaded parking increased to 96% of the total car parking capacity; coverage of the remaining nonshaded parking lots is under progress. Further, CFD is in the process of constructing new car parking facilities at various locations to meet current and future demand.
